- meet some of the Ashlawn teaching staff.

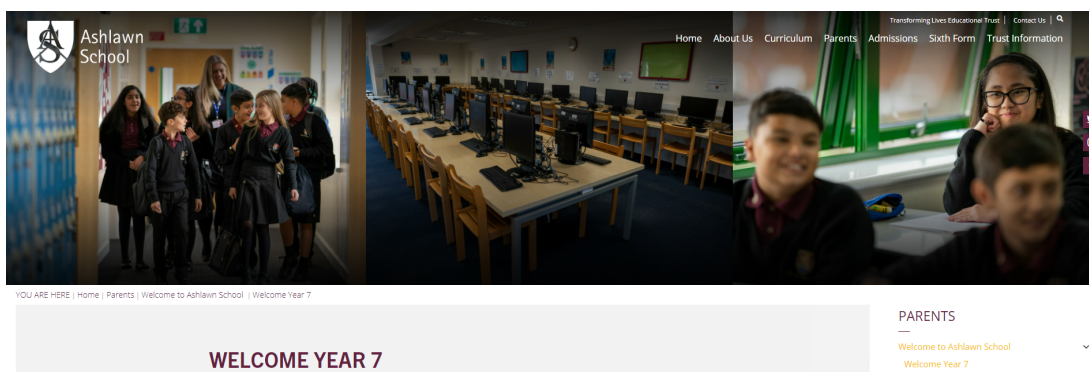
We are really looking forward to welcoming our new Year 7 students to our school. We hope that our students are excited about having their first taste of life at Ashlawn School during our induction days and summer school.

TRANSITION

&

WHAT TO EXPECT IN KEY STAGE 3

Key Stage 3 is the first time that you will study different subjects with specialist teachers.

You will study a range of subjects including reading, English language, English literature, mathematics, science (biology, chemistry, physics), modern foreign languages, history, geography, art, drama, music, design technology, computing, physical education and P.S.H.E.

Teachers at Ashlawn will already have some information about what you have achieved in Primary School and some information on your particular skills and talents.

You will meet up with your form and be registered by your tutor each day. Your form tutor should be the first person to go to if you have any worries about school life.

Transition Activities

In order to help you start making the transition from KS2 to KS3, there will be transition activities which you will be able to access on the school website under the Year 7 subject transition activities section of the Welcome Year 7 area of the school website.

You could do these activities at home! All of the optional transition activities are designed to make the transition from primary school to secondary school as smooth as possible.

We have also put together a booklet of transition activities that you should print off and work through to help you feel prepared to join us as the newest members of the Ashlawn School community. You should bring your completed transition booklet to school with you on your first day so that you can show it to your form tutor! We have also shared a bingo challenge with you all; completing this may result in you winning a prize!

EXPECTATIONS OF ASHLAWN STUDENTS

- Bring your exercise book or folder and planner to every lesson.
- Keep your books and folders tidy and well presented.
- Never doodle or graffiti anywhere other than on your whiteboard.
- Always have a pen, pencil, ruler, rubber, and sharpener.
- Use colours when your teacher thinks it is appropriate e.g. mind maps.
- Draw diagrams, tables and graphs in pencil.
- Record and underline the title and date at the start of the lesson.
- Draw a single line through a mistake in your written work e.g. ~~presentation~~.
- Stick worksheets and information sheets neatly by the appropriate learning.
- Complete all classwork and homework activities to the best of your ability.
- If you miss a lesson, find out what was covered and complete the activities so you do not have any gaps in your knowledge.
- Return homework for the deadline set.
- Check Google Classroom and your Gmail accounts every day.

You will also need some subject specific equipment:

Art Kit; French/German/Spanish dictionary – you will find out which language you will be studying in September; scientific calculator; geometry set with a protractor and pair of compasses; English dictionary.

We have a stationary shop in school where students can buy lots of school equipment!

Frequently Asked Questions

What do I do if I am upset?

Talk to your form tutor, class teacher, Head of Year or Key Stage Leader. Every member of staff wants you to feel happy, safe and confident in school and we will always do our best to help you if you are ever feeling upset.

What do I do if I forget my lunch or have no money on my parent pay account?

If you realise this when you first arrive at school you can let your form tutor know and they will make sure that you are able to get some food throughout the day. If you realise later on in the day then you can come and find your Head of Year or Key Stage Leader who will also be able to help. Our student services team will also be on hand to help out if for any reason you couldn't find your Head of Year or Key Stage Leader. We will always ensure that you get something to eat and drink.

What do I do if I forget my homework?

If you realise when you first arrive at school then you should talk to your form tutor about this and they will be able to reassure you and support you in taking the right steps. If you don't realise until the lesson when your work is due then raise your hand and ask if you can talk to your teacher about your homework at the end of the lesson. When you discuss your homework with your class teacher you can agree an extension date for it to be completed by and then hand it in by that date.

What do I do if I get lost?

Our site is quite large but you will quickly get used to where all of your lessons are. It usually takes most students about 2-3 weeks to feel like they know their way around well. Your form tutor will support you in getting to know the school site and you will find that your peers are a great source of support too. If you are lost on the way to a lesson you can ask any member of staff that you see to help direct you to where you need to be. Our students are also incredibly friendly and helpful and they really enjoy helping to show you where you should be going so there is never any need to panic. You will probably get lost more than once and that is OK!

Will I get in trouble if I am late?

Attendance and punctuality are so important and we do want you to be on time when you start the school day and also when you start each lesson throughout the day. However, we also know that you are likely to get lost during your first few weeks at school. If you arrive to a lesson late you should always apologise and ask where the teacher would like you to sit. Your teacher may talk to you about your lateness during the lesson or at the end of the lesson to make sure that you are OK. You should do your best to always be on time. If you are late and arrive after registration ends you should sign in at student services.

What do I do if I can't do my classwork or homework?

If you are struggling with your classwork then you should raise your hand and wait to speak to the teacher or teaching assistant who will be more than happy to help you. Sometimes, it is also appropriate to ask people who are sat next to you for some support and your teachers will often encourage you to do this. If you are struggling with homework then you should email your subject teacher using your Gmail account or go and see them in person to ask for help. You should always ask for help in advance of the deadline so that you can receive the help that you need and still hand your homework in on time.

What do I do if I can't find my friends?

If you can't find your friends then you should come and find your Head of Year and they will do their very best to help you! To avoid this situation you should arrange meeting places with your friends so that you can all stay together!

What do I do if I am worried about another student?

Talk to your form tutor, class teacher, Head of Year or Key Stage Leader. Every member of staff in school is responsible for looking after you all and we will do our very best to listen to your worries and then help with whatever the problem may be.

What do I do if I lose something?

It is really important that you keep your belongings with you at all times. You should never leave belongings somewhere and then come back to get them later – even if you are outside playing! It is also important to make sure that all of your belongings are easily identified as being yours. This means adding labels to your clothes, shoes and bag. Please don't just write your first name on your belongings as we have lots of students in school who share the same first name. Please ensure that your full name is on all of your items. If you do lose something our staff and students are really good at handing in any items that get found. Lost items are kept at reception and so checking here is the first thing to do. If the reception team do not have your lost item do not panic as it may just mean that it hasn't been handed in yet. If a teacher has found your item they may not have had chance to drop it off straight away! If your lost item is not in reception then you should also see your form tutor and they will do their best to help. The vast majority of lost items end up being found and returned to their owners.

Are there any clubs that I can join?

Yes, there are lots of clubs that you can join and activities that you can get involved in. Clubs are available throughout the school and they cover a range of interests so there is something for everyone. Joining clubs is a great way of making new friends and you should take advantage of as many opportunities as you can to attend them when you join us at Ashlawn School. On the whole, the clubs offered in school are free of charge and do not require any letter of permission to attend. You simply need to turn up and make sure that you have made your parents aware that you will be later home!

How does lunch work?

Lunch can be pre-ordered using ParentPay or you can bring a packed lunch to school. You should not bring any money to school with you as you will not need it! Whether you have purchased food or have brought a packed lunch there is a large seating area where you can have your lunch and chat with your friends. When you finish your lunch you should put all of your litter in the bin and then you can go outside and socialise with your friends and get some fresh air!

Do I need to worry about detentions?

No. Teachers do not enjoy setting detentions for students, they much prefer being able to issue positive learning points and to praise you for your superb approach towards learning. As long as you are doing your best and meeting the school's expectations then there is no reason that you should be worrying about receiving a detention. Many students go through their secondary school lives without receiving a detention and this will likely also be the case for many of you. If you do receive a detention then you must learn from the situation so that it doesn't happen again.

What do I do if I am feeling unwell?

Talk to your teacher and let them know how you are feeling. They will decide whether they think you should go and see our medical team who will then look after you and call home if necessary. If you feel unwell at break or lunch you should find your Head of Year.

Can I bring my phone to school?

Yes, but this needs to be turned off and handed in at the gate as soon as you arrive in school. If you do not hand your phone in and it goes off during a lesson or you are found to be using it during the school day then it will be confiscated and stored at reception for your parents/carers to collect.

What do I do if I miss my bus after school?

This is very unlikely to happen but if it did happen you should go to student services who will be able to support you.

While the above questions and answers are by no means exhaustive hopefully they address a number of common concerns that you may have. If you have any other questions you can email them in to us and we will reply as soon as we can.
